David Izaguirre Jr.

Inspired by the industrial urban landscapes of his native city of Philadelphia and his traditional Puerto Rican/Mexican Culture, Visual Artist David Izaguirre Jr. has been honing his skill in traditional and digital works since the age of 4. Nurtured by family and teachers, his studies in CAPA (the High School for the Creative & Performing Arts of Philadelphia) & the Art Institute, helped in his creation of a style that blends a "Color Outside of the Lines" approach with an emotionally vulnerable, yet dark and brash



flair. He notes influences drawn from Graphic Novel/ Illustrations and comic books, to notable painters such as Marcel Duchamp and his 1912 Modernist Classic "Nude Descending a Staircase No.2".

Expressionistic overtones grab hold of emerging organic form and bleed out in moments of raw emotion in notable pieces such as "the Truest You," to works that raise awareness in matters of substance abuse with 1st place LACC (Latin American Community Center) winner "the Lightworker."

David has exhibited works in the Delaware Museum of Art, raised charity through auctioned donations to the Christiana Care Health System of Delaware, Volunteered with $\Omega ALAC$ (National Association for the Itatino Arts & Culture), is a published illustrator for Several Ititerary works, and continues his work as a Freelancer. He has taught art as a mentor and Counselor with the YNCA YOCTH outreach summer program in New Jersey and continues to teach young adults.
